Frey Gulch Area Trail System

Tenderfoot Mountain Trail – 9034

Pah-qwun Trail – 9149

Incline Trail – 9035

Difficulty: EASY TO MODERATE

Trail Use: Moderate

Length: Tenderfoot Mountain Trail – 1.87 mi., Pah-qwun Trail – 0.8 mi., Incline Trail – 1.3 mi.

Elevation: The Keystone Ski Area parking lot is at 9,320 feet. The highest point is at the Tenderfoot Mountain Trail / Tenderfoot Mountain Road junction which is at 10,880 feet.

Elevation Gain: 1,560 feet

Open In Winter To: X-C SKIING, SNOWSHOEING

Open In Summer To: HIKING, HORSE, MTN. BIKING

Access #1: Keystone Ski Area Tenderfoot parking lot

- From I-70, take Exit 205, Silverthorne / Dillon and travel south on Highway 6 for approximately 6.6 miles. At the traffic light, turn left on the Saints John Road.
- Take the first road to the right (Lone Pine Circle) and park in the Tenderfoot paved parking lot.
- The trail starts near the junction of Saints John Road and Lone Pine Circle.

Access #2: Summit County Landfill

- From I-70, take Exit 205, Silverthorne / Dillon and travel south on Highway 6 for approximately 5.4 miles. Turn left on to the County Landfill Road.
- Proceed about 1.1 miles past the shooting range and park in the area about 200 feet before the gate.

Trail Highlights:

- The trails pass through stands of aspen and lodgepole pine.
- The trails offer views of Dillon Reservoir.
- The Oro Grande Trail can be accessed from the Frey Gulch Road at the landfill.
- Pah-qwun is the Ute name for Frog. The Ute people were the original inhabitants of this area.

Important information:

- Be courteous to horseback riders. Stop and let them pass.
- Trails in the area are used frequently by horseback riders from the Keystone Stables. Some of these trails are closed to mountain bikes for safety.
- Mountain bikes may only be used on trails marked with a mountain bike symbol. If there is no sign, it is closed to that use.
- Dog owners - Please be considerate of other trail users. Keep your dog in sight and when you encounter others, call the dog to your side until they pass. Use a stick to remove dog feces from the trail.
