Keystone Gulch Area Trail System

Keystone Aqueduct Trail – 9132 Cah-vah Trail – 9013 Darwin Trail – 9025

Difficulty: EASY TO MODERATE

Trail Use: Moderate

Length: Keystone Aqueduct Trail – 2.1 mi., Cah-vah Trail – 0.9 mi., Darwin Trail – 0.2 mi.

Elevation: The Keystone Gulch Trailhead is at 9,260 feet. The highest point is on Trail 46 at

9,880 feet.

Elevation Gain: 620 feet

Open In Winter To: X-C SKIING, SNOWSHOEING

Open In Summer To: HIKING, HORSE, MTN. BIKING (Except for Cah-vah and Darwin)

Access: Keystone Gulch Trailhead

• From I-70, take Exit 205, Silverthorne / Dillon and travel south on Highway 6 for approximately 6.5 miles. At the traffic light, turn right and make an immediate left on Soda Ridge Road.

• Proceed about 0.8 miles and turn left. The trailhead is at the gate (open after June 15).

• There is a trail with a small bridge that crosses the creek or you can travel up the road for about 1/2 mile and the Keystone Aqueduct Trail is on the right. There is a small foot bridge (upstream).

Trail Highlights:

- The trails pass through stands of lodgepole pine and offer views of Keystone Golf Course.
- Cah-vah is the Ute name for horse. The Ute people were the original inhabitants of this area.

Important information:

- Be courteous to horseback riders. Stop and let them pass.
- The Cah-vah and Darwin trails are used frequently by horseback riders from the Keystone Stables.
 These trails are closed to mountain bikes for safety.
- Mountain bikers can access the trail system at four points along the Soda Ridge Road.
- The Soda Creek Trail accesses the Soda Creek Trail System. See that ROG for trail information.
- Mountain bikes may only be used on trails marked with a mountain bike symbol. If there is no sign, it is closed to that use.
- Dog owners Please be considerate of other trail users. Keep your dog in sight and when you
 encounter others, call the dog to your side until they pass. Use a stick to remove dog feces from
 the trail. There are streams on the northern section of the Keystone Aqueduct Trail.

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
