## Bakers Tank Trail System

**Bakers Tank Trail – #40 Aspen Grove Trail - #9133**

**Mtn. Pride - #9031 Valdero Trail – #9032 Broken Wheel – #9145**

**Difficulty:** Easy

**Trail Use:** Moderate

**Length:** Bakers Tank Trail – 2.3 mi., Aspen Grove Trail – 0.8 mi., Mountain Pride Trail – 1.2 mi., Valdero Trail – 0.8 mi., Broken Wheel Trail – 0.5 mi.

**Elevation:** The lowest elevation is where the Aspen Grove meets the Boreas Pass Road at 10,000 feet. The highest point is on the Mountain Pride Trail at 11,160 feet.

**Elevation Gain/Loss:** 1,160 ft.

**Open In Winter To:** X-C SKIING, SNOWSHOEING (SNOWMOBILING PROHIBITED)

**Open In Summer To:** HIKING, HORSE, MTN. BIKING (e-BIKES PROHIBITED)

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## GETTING THERE

Access: **Bakers Tank Trailhead**

From I-70, take Exit 203, Frisco / Breckenridge and travel south on Highway 9 through Frisco and Breckenridge (approximately 11 miles). At the traffic light near the southern end of town, turn left on the Boreas Pass Road (County Road 10) and proceed about 3.5 miles. The Bakers Tank Trailhead is on the left near the end of the pavement where there is a kiosk. In the summer, you can park here or drive about 2.5 miles on the unpaved Boreas Pass Rd. to the southeastern end of Bakers Tank Trail (at Bakers Tank).

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## ATTRACTIONS AND CONSIDERATIONS

- As the trails pass through stands of lodgepole pine and aspen, there are great views of Brecken-ridge Ski Area and the Ten Mile Range.
- Bakers Tank is where the steam locomotives, designed especially for the tight curves and extreme grades found in mountain environments, took on water.
- Valdero is the name of a nearby historic mining community.
- This area is a great place to view fall colors with the many aspen trees.
- The Boreas Pass Road climbs over Boreas Pass and into Park County.



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## ETHICS AND REGULATIONS

- Mountain bikes may only be used on trails marked with a mountain bike symbol. If there is no sign, it is closed to that use. e-Bike use is prohibited.
- Dog owners - Please be considerate of other trail users. Keep your dog in sight and when you encounter others, call the dog to your side until they pass. Use a stick to remove dog feces from the trail.
